# THE HISTORY OF NATIONAL JUNIOR HONOR SOCIETY

In 1929, the National Association of Secondary School Principals (NASSP) officially established the National Junior Honor Society. Based on the success of the National Honor Society, NASSP recognized the need to honor outstanding students in the early years of their secondary education.

Five main purposes are outlined in the NJHS Constitution and have guided chapters from the beginning: "To create enthusiasm for scholarship, to stimulate a desire to render service, to promote leadership, to develop character, and encourage good citizenship in the students of secondary schools." These purposes also translate into the criteria used for membership selection in each local chapter.

The association connects and engages school leaders through advocacy, research, education, and student programs. 

### **ABOUT NATIONAL** JUNIOR HONOR SOCIETY

Middle level students who demonstrate outstanding scholarship, service, leadership, character, and citizenship deserve to be acknowledged. They also deserve to be challenged, encouraged, nurtured, and inspired. The National Junior Honor Society (NJHS) serves this purpose like no other student organization.

With a tradition of prestige and excellence, NJHS encourages members to continue their achievement, providing them with a foundation for life. Student members become outstanding ambassadors for a school and community by engaging in service projects, leadership training, and more.

More than one million students participate annually in the activities of NJHS and its high school counterpart, the National Honor Society (NHS), nationwide and around the world

Both NHS and NJHS were founded and are administered by the National Association of Secondary School Principals (NASSP).

NIHS instills these critical values in students and encourages them to continue their achievements now and in the future. Membership gives students outstanding opportunities to excel in life

#### MEMBERSHIP SELECTION CRITERIA

Every chapter establishes qualifications for membership based on the five pillars of NJHS: scholarship, service, leadership, character, and citizenship.

Minimum eligibility requirements, per the NJHS National Constitution, are as follows:

- Enrollment in grades 6 (second semester) through 9 (Ninth graders are eligible if grade 9 is part of the middle school)
- A cumulative grade point average of at least 85 percent, B, a 3.0 on a 4.0 scale, as defined by the chapter
- Demonstrated volunteer or service hours
- An excellent record of behavior in and out of school
- Participation in leadership roles in school and/or community activities

Students must have attended the school for at least one semester before being considered for candidacy.

The local chapter is required to publish its selection procedures. The chapter adviser, a member of the faculty, is the key contact for details on all chapter policies and procedures.

### **BECOMING AN ACTIVE MEMBER**

Students become members of NJHS through their school chapter. Schools establish a chapter and maintain an annual affiliation with the national office. A faculty member, typically appointed by the principal, serves as the chapter adviser and supervises all chapter operations.

Students are identified as candidates for membership when achieving the required cumulative average as established by the chapter. Candidates submit information to the chapter regarding the remaining criteria for selection. Final selections are made by a five-member faculty council in accordance with the national constitution and local chapter bylaws. Once selected and inducted, each member is expected to maintain the chapter standards that led to selection and assumes certain obligations as outlined by the chapter bylaws and national constitution.

As part of these obligations, chapters undertake one or more school or community service projects each year, and members regularly participate in those projects. Each member also chooses and completes at least one

individual service project to reflect his or her talents and interests.
